High River actors to perform at Edmonton's Fringe Festival

HIGH RIVER - A pair of High River actors are venturing to the fringe of theatre society this summer.

Steve Penman and George Stone have been accepted to the world-famous Edmonton Fringe Festival running August 18 to

They are scheduled to present their one-act play Courtship six times throughout the festival.

The festival has been a bastion of talented stage performers from Canada and the world since its inception 14 years ago.

This year's festival, dubbed the 14 Carat Festival, is expected to draw close to 500,000 people to watch about 160 plays unfold at 16 indoor venues and on three outdoor stages.

Courtship, Penman's first attempt as a playwright, made its stage debut in High River in February under the scrutiny of a provincial adjudicator.

It won the right there to move up to the Provincial One-act Festival in March, held in Westlock, north of Edmonton.

The provincial winner is guaranteed a spot in the Edmonton Fringe Festival.

"That spot is the plum for winning the provincials," said

Unfortunately, another play walked off with the plum.

Penman and Stone received an honorable mention for Courtship - still admirable, but lacking the guaranteed spot.

That meant they had to rely on their application in the firstcome, first-served entry registry and battle hundreds of other performers for stage space.

Penman had applied to the festival in December of 1994 to get a jump on the crowd and as a shrewd back-up if they didn't win the provincial spot.

"I applied before I had even finished writing the play. It wasn't finalized," he laughed.

Penman explained their application was frustratingly jammed at the very bottom of the waiting list at one point, but later worked its way to the top.

A last minute cancellation while Penman happened to be

schmoozing with festival officials landed him and Stone space on the schedule.

Penman and Stone are putting some polish on their performance before they head north to Edmonton in August.

Penman said the Fringe Festival is a big event for culture in Alberta and compares favorably to other provincial attrac-

"It's like the Calgary Stampede, but with theatre and no cowboys."

Penman and Stone will put on performances of Courtship at the High River Centennial Library on August 9 and 10 beginning at

Oliver! coming soon to High River

Although restrictions in cast size resulted in many talented individuals not getting a part, it is encouraging to know they are available and may audition again for a later production.

The cast was chosen and roles filled as follows: As Oliver, Shari Klassen will play a delightful, strong-spirited orphan struggling to make his way in the world. Ben Salamon, as the Artful Dodger will take care of Oliver in London and lead him to the hideout of Fagin, played by George Stone. Bill Regnier will cause fear and trembling in the audience as well


as Oliver in his role of Bill Sykes and the romantic role of Nancy will be played by Chelsea Krokosinski. 
Q. Some of the names that Cheryl mentioned were familiar. Were some of those kids involved in *The King and I?*

A. Are you saying I'm old? I can still drink you under the table! Waitress another expresso, and make this one a triple.





Talent of Windmill Theatre restricted only by stage

Hats off to Windmill Theatre Players for its courage in producing Lionel Bart's sprawling musical Oliver!, based on Charles Dickens' Oliver Twist.

Oliver! is probably the most ambitious undertaking of this veteran amateur theatre company, which has been entertaining for the Foothills area for more than 20 years with just about every Broadway musical ever produced.

Why ambitious? In addition to a cast of 54 (including 22 children) Oliver!, set in the 19th century slums of east-end London, boasts eight different sets, involving 15 scene changes during its more than two-hour duration.

With the very definite limitations of the Highwood Memorial Centre's stage, co-directors Laura Wall and Karen King were faced with two major problems: (1) moving the 54 cast members on and off stage, and (2) changing the sets in the minimum amount of time.

The first problem was solved by having the players enter and exit through the audience, creating an 'interactive' atmosphere, where you become part of the play's action.

The scene-change problem is never really solved, as only a piano accompaniment bridges the time-gap between changes, which are effected in full view of the audience.

The 1961 Broadway production handled this problem with the benefit of a revolving stage. While the current scene is played to the audience, the next scene is being set up, and revolves to the front during a no more than 10 second black-out.

Accordingly, Windmill's production suffers somewhat, but by no fault of its own. Once the audience is able to accept the technical difficulties, this production of Oliver! is a delight.

Seventy-eight children auditioned for 22 parts, and Windmill was fortunate in their choice of a 10-year-old girl for the role of Oliver Twist. Shari Klassen displays a confidence in the interpretation of this difficult role.

Talented 12-year-old Ben Salamon gave a sterling performance as Artful Dodger. His stirring, cockney persona was an ideal foil for Oliver's innocence; his scenes with Fagin were among the shows memorable moments.

Strong performances are also turned in by George Stone as Fagin, and Windmill newcomer Bill Regnier as the villainous Bill

Sykes. Their production numbers serve as the cornerstone of the show: Fagin's Pick a Pocket or Two, Be Back Soon and Reviewing the Situation, while Bill Sykes spreads as aura of menace with his guttural rendering of My Name.

Also among Lionel Bart's recognizable score you'll hear: I'd Do Anything, As Long As He Needs Me, It's a Fine Life, Food, Glorious Food, Boy For Sale, and the title song Oliver.

Another Windmill newcomer, Ron Schmidt was impressive as Mr. Bumble, and displayed a

pleasant singing voice on Boy For Sale and a duet with Shannon Simington (Widow Corney) I Shall Scream.

Both Shari Klassen (Oliver) newcomer Chelsea Krokosinski (as Nancy, Bill Sykes doxy) were at times quite tentative during their musical numbers. Wireless microphones clipped to their costumes would have helped to better amplify their voices. Krokosinski's performance will improve as the engagement continues.

Secondary roles are capably

filled by Jim Goodwin and Janice Baldwin (as Mr. and Mrs. Sowerberry), Krista Hopkins (as Bet), Cliff Cameron (as Mr. Brownlow), Ray Fox (as Dr. Grimwig) and Celia Penman (as Mrs. Bedwin).


The adult chorus delivers with considerable power on the production numbers Oom-Pah-Pah and Who Will Buy, while the children shine on Food, Glorious Food.


Laura Wall and Karen King bring considerable experience to their directing responsibilities, and the end result is an enjoyable evening of musical theatre.


RON SCHMIDT ------Mp Bumble
