





Windmill one-acts debut as dessert theatre fare

This marks the 22nd year Windmill Theatre Players have participated in the Alberta Drama Festival Association's One Act Festival.

Windmill Theatre started doing dessert theatre in 1993 as a way to perform its plays for an audience before having to perform for competition. The dessert theatres have proven to be popular.

This year's dessert theatre will take place Feb. 19-20 at the Highwood Memorial Centre. Doors will open at 6:30 p.m. with curtain at 7:30 p.m. There will be no advance sales, tickets will be sold at the door only.

Windmill Theatre will enter six plays in the dessert theatre, plus a special showcase play from One-Eyed King Productions. The theme this year is "High River Dance," and there will be dances between plays.

The play line-up for Feb. 19 will be: "Sibling Revelry," in which a brother and sister must decide what to do with their parents' remains. "A Tantalizing," in which a woman invites a homeless man home for a meal, and "Egos," in which a playwright, a director and an actor rehearse a play together, but soon are miles apart as superegos take over.

On Feb. 20 the line-up will be: "School For Pedflies," the story of a Mountie training pedophiles to keep out of jail finds himself trapped between a boy who wants to be a girl and a woman who wants him. "Louis and Dave" is the story of two redneck buddies go cruisin' for chicks and one of the fellows is revealed as a cultured intellectual. "Scarecrow" portrays the way evil works on peo-

ple, with the central character a young girl coming of age. "The House Still Stands" is coarse acting, which is a genre of play designed to incorporate stage disasters, bad acting, horrible directing and anything else that can go wrong in live theatre.

Those plays plus three other entries from BraggArts Theatre of Bragg Creek will be presented at the One Act Play Festival on Feb. 26-27 at the Highwood Memorial Centre. There will be three sessions during this One Act Festival. on Feb. 26 the curtain will be at 7:30 p.m. On Feb. 27, the curtain will be at 1 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. There will be no advance sales, tickets will be sold at the door only.
